Brantwood for Girls is a meaningful place that will change you forever. You will meet new people, try new things and have the best experience possible.

When we arrived, I said my goodbyes to my family and then was brought to the nature shack. There were three counselors and another camper. The counselors taught us how to make a bracelet. I wasn't very good; in fact it was so bad it eventually wound up in the trash. Then I was brought to the basketball court where we played an awkward game of knee tag and light sabers.

Later I went to see my cabin and meet my roommates. I was put in Minnewaska. There were eight of us including me. It was hard to talk to them at first because they were just strangers unpacking clothes. Eventually, conversation flowed easily. We had two cabin counselors that were both funny, kind, and caring. The rest of the day went on with awkward conversations and some bonding.

After all the awards were handed out, we watched a slideshow of all the moments from camp. Everyone was crying at this point. We weren't crying because we won awards but that did matter, we were crying because we may never get to see each other again. We all made an impact in each other's life and created such great friendships. Overall, prize night was the best night ever!!

## Margaret Cook Gurney

The entire Brantwood community was saddened to learn that Margaret Cook Gurney—the longest serving Associate Trustee in the history of the Camp and a much-beloved member of the Brantwood family—died on April 28, 2022, peacefully, after a long battle with cancer.

Margaret's involvement with Brantwood began at an early age, as she was the daughter of longtime Brantwood Director Charles T. Cook. When Brantwood established the program for girls in the summer of 1982, Ms. Cook served as the Camp's first Girls' Program Director, a pioneering role she filled again during Brantwood's second summer with girls. In 1983, Ms. Cook was elected an Associate Trustee of the Camp, the first woman to hold any official position on the Brantwood Board in more than sixty years. As formal Advisor to Brantwood for Girls in 1984, she helped facilitate the program's transition to its Camp Holiday site in Milford, NH.

That same summer, Margaret married then-Brantwood Director Bill Gurney, in a ceremony held on the deck of her parents' Dublin, NH home. Margaret and Bill's two sons—Henry and Charlie—would themselves go on to successful careers as Brantwood counselors.

Over the ensuing decades, Mrs. Gurney would continue to be an active supporter



of and contributor to the Brantwood experience. For many years she served as editor of the annual Brantwood newsletter. She was an advocate for the move of the girls' camp to Camp Quinapoxet in Rindge, NH, and then ultimately back to its current location on the original Brantwood hill on the Peterborough/Greenfield line. For almost forty years Mrs. Gurney taught Yoga at Brantwood, making new friends and continuing to inspire generations of Brantwood girls. And both in season and out she and her husband would welcome members of the Brantwood family to their Dublin home.

"Margaret's legacy and lifelong con-

tributions to Brantwood touched many of our lives," said Noelle Leonard, who was a staff member during those earliest summers of girls at Brantwood, served as Director of Brantwood for Girls from 1988 through 1995, and is currently interim President of the Brantwood Board.

Amy Willey, one of the very first campers at Brantwood for Girls and later both Director of the girls' camp and longtime Brantwood Executive Director, also remembered her dear friend and mentor. "Anyone who knew Margaret knows how close to her heart she held Brantwood and all the campers and staff who crossed paths with her over the years," wrote Ms. Willey in an open message to the Brantwood family. "She loved all of you, whether she ever met you or not. I don't think she ever missed the chance to stop by and check in on the happenings at Brantwood, or lead a yoga period, or tend to her lilies on the hill, or layout and edit a newsletter, or give love and advice to anyone who needed it. She once said that she never wanted to be a leader, yet she was just that. A quiet leader in the background who diligently watched over Brantwood and our community."

"A celebration of Margaret's life will be held at Brantwood Camp in October," added Ms Leonard, "and the exact date and specific information will be provided soon. All of us in the Brantwood community grieve along with the Gurney family."


